Principal's Message

Dear parents, students and friends,

The highlight for many over the past few weeks have been the two camps. I was privileged to be able to attend both camps with two fantastic groups of students who really made the most of all opportunities available to them. First, the 5/6 students along with Ms Myring and Mrs Ramsden ventured off to Wilsons Prom for a week of exploring the natural beauty while experiencing many firsts along the way. We hiked, fished, surfed, played in the river, explored the beaches, made sand castles, spotted wombats, rolled down sand dunes and learnt about the underwater ecosystems in the river. Special thanks to Mrs Ramsden for her fabulous cooking; the food was amazing. The following week I was back on a bus (as a passenger this time, not the driver) and headed in the opposite direction to Ballarat with the 3/4 students to experience the olden days at Sovereign Hill. 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
